

### **About Us**

LWF Iraq has been responding to the priorities of internally displaced persons (IDPs), returnees, and host communities since the conflict started in 2014. With the active conflict over and IDPs gradually moving back to their areas of origin, LWF Iraq is strengthening holistic programming integrating a rights- based approach. The program is expanding its areas of operation, especially in Gol through local partners, in order to support returnees and host communities to rebuild their lives, while continuing to support IDPs, in Iraqi Kurdistan.



# Who We Work With

In 2023, LWF Iraq supported more than 68,835 people.



- **19,962** IDPs (29%)
- 138 refugees (0.2%)
- 40,613 returnees (59%)
- **8,122** host community (11.8%)



- **65.394** adults (95%)
- **3,441**children (5%)



- **35,794** women and girls (52%)
- **33,041** men and boys (48%)



Issa Ahmed Ali, 28, Mukhtar of Kani-Spi Neighborhood in Sumel District, shared the challenges his community faced before the construction of a formal water network. Informal water connections were purchased and installed directly by residents and often broke during new house constructions, making it costly and unreliable.

LWF's intervention, building a formal network, significantly improved the situation. "I thank LWF for allowing me to oversee the project as part of the supervisory committee," Issa said. The project alleviated water scarcity and brought positive change, providing the community with a reliable and regulated water supply.

# **Our Impact**

LWF Iraq focuses on three programmatic areas: protection and social cohesion, livelihoods, and WASH. We work in each programmatic area at the individual, community, and institutional levels, and across the humanitarian, development, and peace nexus. For 2023, Iraq invested 2 million Euros in programming. Expenditure and its impact are as follows:
