


### **About us**


After conducting emergency operations including cash and food and non-food items distribution to 80,000 Ukrainian refugees, LWF Poland is now focusing on long-term development activities. The program prioritizes providing mental health and psycho-social support through six community centers across Poland. It also focuses on social cohesion and includes locals in some activities. LWF Poland works closely in collaboration with local Lutheran parishes and NGOs.

In 2022, LWF Poland supported more than **147,000** Persons of Concern (PoC)

# **Our impact**

After focusing on a multi-purpose cash response, LWF Poland currently implements psycho-social activities. We strongly believe this is crucial to support Ukrainian refugees overcome the trauma of war and the many obstacles they encountered while fleeing their country. This represented an investiment of 6.2 million euros last year. For 2022, the investments and results per programmatic area are as follows:





Protection and social cohesion 385,114 €

70,000 individuals received cash assistance 6,800 individuals could cover their basic needs in food, medicines, and clothes 22,376 individuals received hygiene kits 1,800 individuals received winterization vouchers

2,975 women and girls received dignity kits

They want to help them, support them as much as possible. Women ask me about stress management, for advice in family conflicts, and how to live meaningfully in times of war. It is very important to save the family."

Iryna Karpenko, a psychologist working at the LWF community center in Biesko-Biala and a refugee herself. The LWF community centers help refugees through psycho-social councelling and they support local integration while preserving culture and language.
