



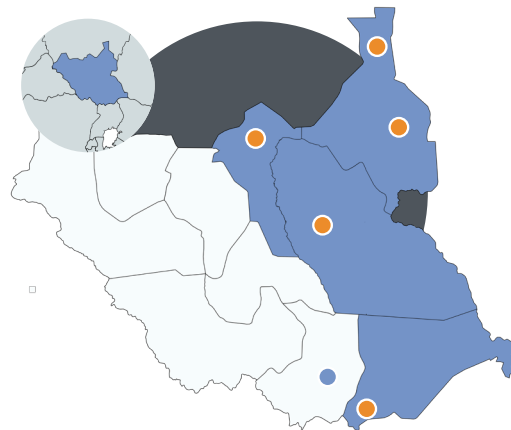

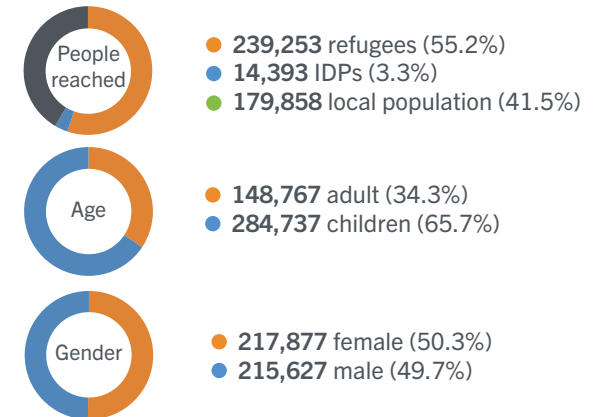

Who we work with

In 2023, LWF South Sudan supported over **433,504** people.



Athieng Pandak Achol

Athieng, 10, is the seventh child in her family of nine, displaced from Kuei to Wuchung due to flooding in 2020. Born in 2014, she began school in 2022 at Wuchung Pre-Primary School, established by LWF in 2021, as Kuei lacked schools.

Despite early educational setbacks, she completed PP2 in 2023 and advanced to Primary 1 in 2024, aspiring to become a doctor. Her parents support her education despite challenges. Her mother thanked LWF for their school and requested continued support, citing limited resources and the need for a health center. "Wuchung is good," she said, "but we need hope."

Our impact

LWF South Sudan's country strategy for 2019-2024 relies on three programmatic areas: Livelihoods, Quality Services, Protection and Social Cohesion. Additionally, Gender Justice, Climate Justice and Human Rights are cross-cutting approaches that we apply in all sectors of intervention. For 2023, LWF South Sudan invested 11.8 million euros in programming.



LIVELIHOODS

- 879 vulnerable individuals were supported with savings and income generating activities
- 711 Farmers were supported with poultry and goats
- 1,793 farmers were supported with seeds and tools to increase their production
- 629 benefitted from skills development (computer training, tailoring and carpentry)
- 500 benefitted from fish production



QUALITY SERVICES

- 79,656 learners received scholastic materials,
- 829 with disabilities got learning aids
- 5,019 adolescent girls and vulnerable women benefitted from menstrual hygiene kits
- 8,101 now access potable water
- 24,210 received cash assistance for shelter, NFI, multipurpose and food support
- 416 returnees were transported and supported with multi-purpose cash assistance



PROTECTION & SOCIAL COHESION

- 8,081 children received case management support and enjoyed structured PSS activities at Child Friendly Spaces
- 555 CwDs benefitted from hygiene kits and life skills training
- 65 vulnerable women were supported with start-up capital
- 1,526 individuals benefitted from advocacy initiatives



Ivan Robin

A solar-powered water system was installed at Oyere Primary School, addressing the challenge of clean water access. Previously, students and teachers walked 3 kilometers for water, disrupting lessons. Now, water is available within the school, improving learning conditions for 590 students and the community.

Ivan Robin, 17, shared the impact: "With water in school, teachers and pupils stay throughout the day without interruptions. No more fetching or drinking from streams—lessons continue smoothly." The project has boosted health, focus, and enrollment while fostering community inclusion. It highlights the power of sustainable solutions in transforming education and daily life.
